The shower gets more use than the bathtub in many households. That's why some homeowners are ripping out their tubs and creating bigger showers instead. Extra shower space allows for multiple shower heads, a built-in seat and designs without shower doors, said John Petrie, in an interview about current kitchen and bath trends. Showers can be designed without a threshold, which look more contemporary and are easier for people to use as they get older. "People really like the bigger showers. They like that there's elbow room," said Susie Johnson, a real-estate agent. Meanwhile, comments she hears from prospective buyers about whirlpool tubs when walking through a property are often along the lines of: "That's a nice tub but I don't take baths," she said.

"Now, keep in mind that a home should still have at least one bathtub," Johnson added. "Having a tub will be important at resale for some buyers, particularly those with small children. For high-end homes, buyers expect a shower and a separate bathtub, especially in the master bathroom," she said. One other possible consideration before ripping out a bathtub is how it will be viewed by multiple-listing services when you're selling the home. Realtor.com, for example, defines a "full bathroom" as having a toilet, a sink and a bathtub. A room with a toilet sink and shower is a "three-quarter bathroom." A room with only a toilet and sink is defined as a "half bathroom" or "powder room." "But those definitions aren't universal, and often a full bathroom is considered any room in which a person can bathe (be it by bath or





shower). Besides, descriptions of what the bathrooms contain in the listing help clear up any

confusion," she added.

Passage 2 (GAT58/1)

The stakes could not be higher for China, the largest investor in South Sudan's oil sector, as fierce fighting continues between forces loyal to President Salva Kiir and those of his former deputy. Some of the largest oil fields China operates are in areas controlled by fighters backing Riek Machar, the country's vice-president until he was sacked in July. Oil production has already dropped by 20% since the onset of the conflict three weeks ago and more than 300 Chinese workers have been evacuated. The specter of their Libyan experience also weighs heavily on the Chinese minds -- project after project now lies deserted because of heavy fighting during the Arab Spring uprising of 2011, inflicting huge losses on China. It is no surprise then that China is putting its full weight behind the peace talks in Addis Ababa.

Foreign Minister Wang Yi was in the Ethiopian capital on Monday and made it clear hat China wanted both sides to stop fighting and seek a reasonable and rational way out. According to media reports, he was even willing to mediate personally between <u>the warring</u> <u>sides</u>. "It is unclear if Mr. Wang has been able to do this, but his message was important," reports the BBC's Emmanuel Igunza from Addis Ababa.

"It demonstrates how seriously the international community is taking the crisis -- with many diplomats present at the talks," he says. Apart from China's Africa envoy Zhong Jianhua, US special envoy Donald Booth and EU special representative Alexander Rondos are also attending.





Bangkok has many options of co-working spaces for freelancers, start-ups and small companies and their number is on the rise. *Hive* in Bangkok, the brand's first international branch outside Hong Kong, has an inspiring interior with its loft feel and ample natural light coming through large windows. The seven-storey building offers different settings. You can work like you do at coffee shops in the lounge area. If you come and go with laptops, there are <u>hot desks</u> that you can use for a short time. If you need to bring your desktop and leave it there on your own desk, it can be arranged. Should you already work with a small team of people, rent your own office. Or work while drinking beer at the rooftop garden bar.

Hive creates an environment that encourages productivity but connects like-minded people who work in different trades. They bring members together through activities such as movie nights and networking over beers. They also have Hivers Seeking Help, an email list that members can use to ask for or give help. People who have already signed up with them include a film-maker, magazine team, app developer and advertising agency. The ratio

between Thai and expat members is now 50:50.

Passage 4 (GAT59/1)

Since Charles Darwin's day, scientists have hotly debated whether some animal display emotions beyond those associated with parental care or other aspects of survival and reproduction. Darwin thought that, because of the evolutionary connection between humans and other animal, many emotions must be similar across species. He believed that monkey, for instance, experienced grief and jealousy. As well as pleasure and anxiousness. But assigning emotion such as these to animals gradually lost its popularity among scientists. By the early 20th century, the behaviorist theory **held sway**. Claiming that only observable behavior of animals, not their interior lives, could be studied with rigor. However, the belief in animal emotion has gradually been revived, thanks in part to anecdotes from long-term field studies on large-brained mammals. In Tanzania, a young chimpanzee died from grief only weeks after the death of his mother.

In Kenya, elephants attended to dying comrades and stroke the bones of deceased relative. Field biologists and anthropologists began to ask whether, and how, animals mourn.

Orange – according to recent data from iSeeCars.com, a search engine that collects data from online car listings. Black cars were the most popular, regardless of gender – getting about 16% of inquiries last year. White was a close second with 15% and silver had 13%

As for gender, men and women were sharply divided on brighter colors. Orange wasn't popular for either gender, but shoppers who were interested in the color were overwhelmingly male. Men liked brown paint jobs, but women preferred gold and silver much more often.

Surprisingly, red isn't as popular as it used to be. Red is typically one of the most popular color outside the grey scale. Swapalease.com said in January that red cars were listed the most behind white, silver and black. Red, however, fell behind blue in iSeeCars.com ranking, though it still had a good lead in front of other colors – including green, gold, beige, brown and yellow.



Passage 6 (GAT59/1)

When British doctor Greg Lewis wanted to contribute more to the world, he looked into leaving the U.K. to serve less fortunate patients. That seemed a better way to do good than working in a pristine hospital.

But when he crunched the numbers, they told a different story. By treating patients in a poor country, he calculated he might save 4 lives a year. By choosing a specialty at home and working toward an annual salary of \$200,000, he could donate up to half to a charity providing antimalarial bed nets – saving dozens of lives per year. As William MacAskill explains in his book, Doing Good Better. Lewis chose to earn in order to give.

MacAskill takes a surprising approach to the rules of charity, suggesting that impulsive acts of kindness can often do more harm than good. Boycotting brands that use sweatshops, for example, risks putting workers out of much-needed jobs with better conditions than they





would otherwise find. Choosing where and how much to give should be "a scientific approach," he writes.

It's also a choice that should become a priority for corporations, Matthieu Ricard argues. In his new book, The power of Compassion to Change Yourself and the World, the author maintains that investing in acts of kindness can actually help make a profit. After Johnson & Johnson started a health initiative, for example, two-thirds of its smoker employees quit cigarettes – saving the company \$250 million in health care bills.
